New Pool House to be ready for Opening Day!

Get ready to make a splash! Crafton's new pool bathhouse is set to open just in time for the summer season. The modern facility boasts renovated changing rooms, a family restroom, direct access to the pool, and accessible features designed to accommodate all visitors. With a fresh and inviting design, the bathhouse promises a delightful experience for pool-goers. Construction is currently wrapping up as Crafton Public Works completes the concrete work at the entrance. This in-house work has saved about \$60,000. The \$250,000 DCNR grant further reduced the remaining \$660,000 Borough cost to approximately \$410,000.

Borough officials, contractors, and the Crafton Public Works crew worked tirelessly to ensure the new amenity benefits all pool goers. Residents and visitors can look forward to enjoying the new bathhouse while swimming, sunbathing, or attending events at the Crafton Pool this summer.

Opening Day is Saturday, May 25, 2024



The pool will be open for the Memorial Day and Labor Day weekends. The regular season will begin on Saturday, June 1 and run through Sunday, August 18. Additional limited hours/

days during the weeks after the regular operating season ends may be added depending on weather and staff availability.

Pool pass applications will be accepted beginning May 1st. You will need a photo to complete the application process. Pool pass rates remain the same as last year. While you must re-apply for your pass each year, those with e-passes or physical passes from last year will keep the same ones they have. Please go to www.craftonborough.com/crafton-pool or use the QR code below to apply for your season pass.

Member passes are available only to Crafton residents. Non-resident passes are available to Ingram, Thornburg, Rosslyn Farms, and Carnegie Borough residents only. Proof of residency is required.

All non-pass holders will pay the FLAT RATE of \$15 per day for general admission.

Information on Swim Lessons and Pool Rentals will be available when the pool opens in May. Stop down and speak with Pool Management.

"It's really not about my goals; it's about listening to residents, and understanding their wants and needs and concerns for our community, and then taking those into consideration when making decisions for our community. Manager's Message

Trash Talking

As many residents have undoubtedly heard, garbage collection rates are skyrocketing across the region. Some communities have had to pass difficult tax increases, and several have

had to put their contracts out to bid multiple times because they didn't get acceptable options.

But why hasn't Crafton seen these changes? Crafton never lost the ability to recycle glass (as much of the region did) and we have not yet seen a significant jump in our prices. Why? Crafton did not experience these changes because the Borough has been operating under a ten-year contract that started in 2014. This has protected Borough residents from the significant changes happening in the industry. That will change in 2025 as the Borough's contract expires at the end of this year.

Why are these changes happening? Contrary to what some people are saying, it is not primarily due to inflation. Though inflation undoubtedly plays a part. The most significant change happened in 2017 when China launched a policy called National Sword which placed very strict contamination limits on recyclable materials sent to China. And, in 2018 they started to require secondary materials that were less than 0.5% contaminated.

This dramatically changed the ability of the US market to sell its secondary materials. Because U.S. haulers primarily rely on single stream recycling (throwing all materials into a single bin) American recycling often had contamination rates over 10%, far higher than is acceptable to produce good secondary materials. This change brought material recycling in the U.S. to a standstill. In fact, many jurisdictions in the U.S. incinerated their recycling or dumped it in the landfill for many months after the policy change.



For the last 5 years, the industry has been investing heavily in equipment and systems designed to improve sorting capabilities and lower contamination. Haulers are also automating collection with specifically designed bins and mechanical arms to pick up them up. Those haulers are pushing those investment costs onto municipalities

and residents around the region.

The Crafton Borough administration is working hard to prepare for this change next year by exploring all possible options. The Borough plans to put out our request for proposals for a materials hauler early and is working to ensure we have options when Council has to select a provider later this year. No matter which option is chosen, Craftonians will see a dramatic increase in their annual trash collection bill next year, possibly more than 100%, and may see new requirements such as using waste and recycling bins provided by the hauler. Resident feedback in the selection process will be important and encouraged.

We will keep residents informed as we seek the best and most reasonably priced provider for Crafton.

Council President's Message

As we look to warmer weather, Crafton continues to progress forward with the interests of our residents at the forefront. Since the last newsletter, we have quite a few accomplishments including:

- 1. **2023 Financials –** Ended the year with a small net surplus that will go into our reserves.
- 2. **2024 Budget -** A fiscally responsible and balanced budget was passed by Council in December.
- 3. **Board/Commission Vacancies -** Filled 13 open seats in 2023. For this year, there are 10 upcoming openings for all residents to apply for consideration.

We are working on the following projects:

- 1. **Pool Bathhouse Renovation -** Construction is near completion. Look for a ribbon cutting ceremony in late May prior to the pool
- 2. **Garbage/Recycling -** Our 10 year contract with Waste Management ends this year. We have begun to look at reasonable cost and service options for 2025 and beyond.
- 3. Multi Municipal Zoning Project Over 80 residents attended a public forum on Feb 3rd to learn about the project and provide feedback. The project will be finalized this year.
- 4. **2024 Road Paving Project -** Utilizing Vitalytics program to determine the roads to be paved this year based on the data.
- 5. Stairs Projects Belvidere railing replacement will be completed soon. The remainder of the grant funds will be used for Clearview/Crafton/Walnut and Fountain/Promenade stairs.
- 6. Crafton Logo Crafton School of the Arts was awarded the contract to update our logo.

Our future projects include:

- 1. **Broadhead Sewer Separation Project –** This is a major project that will improve our sewer systems (as required by Alcosan consent decree) in addition to fixing the corresponding roads with \$7M in grants awarded. Construction to begin later this year.
- 2. Consent Decree for C-20 (Shopping Center) Final smaller project for the Sewer Separation Project is in the planning stage.
- 3. Trails Study A steering committee of residents will be formed to lead the study based on the \$39.1K DCNR grant.
- 4. Recent Grants Awarded \$2.3M from the Commonwealth of PA for the Broadhead Project due to the efforts of Senator Fontana and Representative Deasy.

As a reminder, Council meetings are open to the public, and I encourage residents to attend (2nd and 4th Thursday of every month at 7:00 PM) in person or via Zoom to keep up to date on what is happening in our community. If you have any questions about anything on the agenda or happening in the community, please feel free to reach out to me.

It was good seeing everyone at the Zoning Project Forum, All In Allegheny, Celebration of Lights, and Senior Dinner. On February 13, we recognized the Rec Board and Shade Tree Commission for their incredible efforts last year. I hope to see everyone at the Clean-Up/Arbor Day, May Senior Dinner, Music Festival, and July 4th Celebration. I wish you and your families joy and fulfillment as we start the Spring season, and I continue to appreciate the opportunity to serve you.

Volunteer Fire Department Report

The Crafton VFD finished off 2023 as busy as ever. We finished the year with a total of 445 emergency and non-emergency responses. 321 of these responses were fire related and the balance were medical responses. We had two "first due" house fires. "First Due" fires are those in our locale for which our department is responsible to be the first responders. Many of our calls for service are to assist our surrounding communities to respond to their fires and other emergencies.

2024 has kept pace. As of the end of February, we have responded to 52 calls for service and have assisted a few mutual aid fire departments with building fires already this year. This past winter also marked a new endeavor for the fire department, as its members finished a remodel and obtained all the necessary permits for its new club, Crafton Club 128, located on Station St. across from the municipal building.

Time to Check your Smoke Alarms!

Did you know?

Almost three out of five home fire deaths were caused by fires in properties with no smoke alarms (41%) or smoke alarms that failed to operate (16%)

The risk of dying in a home fire is cut in half in homes with working smoke alarms.

Safety Tips

- Install smoke alarms in every sleeping room and install alarms on every level of the home including the basement.
- Test all smoke alarms at least once a month. Press the test button to be sure the alarm is working.
- A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat, and fire.
- Develop a home fire escape plan and make sure everyone in the home knows the plan
- Working smoke alarms are an important part of a home fire escape plan.
- Replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old.

The Crafton Community Farm in Crafton Park is not your ordinary community garden! Established in 2015, the garden is planted, mulched, watered, weeded and harvested by volunteers who then donate most of the produce to Crafton Ingram Food Pantry and others.

With a generous support grant from The Allegheny Grows branch of Grow Pittsburgh, as well as ongoing cooperation with Crafton Borough, the garden is thriving. The amount of produce harvested has ranged from 1100-1400 pounds each growing season.

For our 2024 Growing Season, we would love for you and your family to get involved. Gardening is a wonderful and fulfilling outdoor activity, and there is no experience necessary. We have tools, gloves, and knowledge to share! One of our volunteers has this to say:

"We've loved the welcoming atmosphere at the Crafton Community Farm, where we meet and learn from our neighbors and build skills around self-sufficiency, while giving back to the community through food pantry donations."

Please consider joining us this season. Whether you become a regular volunteer, or just come for a one-time tour, we would love to see you at the garden! Here is our upcoming schedule:

April 20 and/or 27 – continue planting and weeding, build supports and cattle panel arches, improve soil with borough compost and mulch, reinstall irrigation system.

May 18 or 25 – Spring planting of seeds and seedlings.

June 15 and/or 22 - Summer planting

Open Gardening and new volunteer orientations will be every Saturday at 10am from May to October, weather permitting, or by appointment.

Do I need a permit for that?

The answer is YES! if you are planning any of the following: deck, fence, POOL, retaining walls, home addition, or structural renovation.

This is not an exhaustive list. So, check before you undertake any type of change to your property.

- Plan to submit your permit application at least two weeks before you anticipate construction.
- To limit construction noise and annoyances, Borough Ordinance # 146-14 prohibits activities to begin prior to 7am Monday through Saturday and 10am on Sunday.



Annual permit required for backyard fires



As the days get warmer, you may be thinking of hosting fires with family and friends. In Crafton our houses are often close together, so having a fire here isn't the same as at a campground or in a rural area. Crafton has a burn ordinance that is similar to the Allegheny County ordinance. It stipulates that a yearly permit is required and also details what can and cannot be burned.


Please get your permit! Residents can be cited for burning illegally.

The Burning Permit includes an Affirmation of Understanding that stipulates you will be considerate, follow the terms and conditions of the permit, follow safety precautions, not burn without regard to neighbors, and that failure to do so will be cause of revocation of your permit at any time by the Borough. You also agree to assume all damages which may result from burning done under the permit.

- Fires must be 10 feet from buildings & property lines.
- Only adults 18 or older may burn.
- Fires must be 3' wide or less.
- Only clean burning wood may be used for fuel.
- No burning is allowed on Air Action Days.
- A permit is required to burn.
- Burning apparatuses need to have a spark arrestor.
- Trash, books, magazines, newspapers, cardboard, brush, scrap lumber, vegetation, plywood, construction materials, plastic, furniture, garbage, dead animals, excrement, hair, rubber products, roofing materials, bedding, synthetic materials, insulation, and other items are not permitted to be burned.
- Residents with fires that emit smoke or ash that are or may be objectionable, offensive, or deleterious to human or animal health or permeates across neighboring properties can be directed to extinguish their fire. This can be done by the Fire Department, Code Enforcement, or Police Department. It does not matter if the resident has a legal permit.

Burning permits are issued on an annual basis and expire on December 31st of every year. The application fee is twenty dollars. Renters are allowed to get burning permits, but you need the declaration of authorization to be signed by the owner in order to be approved.





Zoning Update Public Meeting Takeaways

Over 80 people attended the Febuary 3rd Public Meeting to discuss the proposed zoning ordinance update for Crafton Borough. Key points:

- The zoning update aims to implement recommendations from the 2017 Crafton-Ingram Thrive comprehensive plan, adding flexibility where appropriate, enhancing design standards, ensuring compatibility between land uses, and facilitating walkability and transit use.
- Proposed changes include allowing ADUs (accessory dwelling units) and limited neighborhood retail in residential zones, creating a transit-oriented development district near the busway to enable mixed-use development, and providing parking flexibility for businesses.
- There was much discussion around hot topics like ADUs, parking requirements, and the balance between renters and homeowners in the community. Some residents expressed concerns that expanding rental and multi-family housing could negatively impact neighborhood character.
- Borough officials clarified that the zoning changes alone cannot control the renter/owner balance, but they are working to strengthen rental inspection and property maintenance policies separately.
- Residents asked questions about how the zoning update relates to other borough initiatives around blight, infrastructure improvements, and marketing Crafton's assets.
- Next steps include the steering committee reviewing public feedback and working with the consultant to draft the updated zoning ordinance, followed by further public review periods before potential adoption by Borough Council.
- In summary, the meeting provided an overview of the proposed zoning updates and rationale, while giving residents a forum to ask guestions and provide input to help shape the final ordinance. Balancing goals around managed growth, neighborhood character, and community development emerged as key discussion themes.

Expanded Property Tax/Rent Rebate Program Accepting Applications

As I mentioned in the Winter 2023 edition, the Pennsylvania Property Tax/Rent Rebate Program has been expanded for the first time in more than 16 years. The program began accepting applications in mid-January. Applications are due June 30, 2024.

Anyone 65 and older, widows and widowers 50 and older, and people with disabilities 18 and older who had a household income of less than \$45,000 in 2023 are eligible to apply. Please note that half of Social Security income is excluded. The maximum standard rebate has also been increased and is reflected below:

INCOME	MAXIMUN	I REBATE
\$0-\$8,000.		\$1,000
\$8,001-\$15	,000	\$770
\$15,001-\$1	8,000	\$460
\$18,001-\$4	5,000	\$380

The Department of Revenue is encouraging everyone who is newly eligible for the Property Tax/Rent Rebate program to submit their applications as soon as possible. Doing so will help the Department more quickly verify and process applications from first-time applicants, who are required to submit supporting documentation to verify their age and eligibility.

回禁回 provide proof of age. If you receive Social Security or SSI benefits and have proven your age with the Social Security Administration, you do not need to submit proof of age.


